






Migration from the Northern Triangle Countries (Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras) to the United States


- People flee El Salvador, Guatemala, and Honduras, largely due to chronic violence, corruption, and poverty. Crime & homicide rates are high
- Climate changes have had big impacts: hurricanes; the Big Drought: agricultural land has dried up
- Why don't those who flee go to various South American countries? A researcher in this area told me that many So American countries are too unstable and many of the immigrants in the Northern Triangle speak native dialects, rather than Spanish.










Court Backlog Doubled During Trump Administration

The number of unresolved cases pending in U.S. immigration courts more than doubled during the Trump administration, with would-be immigrants waiting an average of more than four years to have their cases heard.






